WELL BEING AWARD PROCESS – UPDATE

Hampstead School is a wellbeing school. Our journey began 5 years ago in 2014 with the publication of the DfE 'Closing the Gap' which gave schools the mandate of auditing and addressing targeted, universal school needs. Part of that journey resulted in the award of AfA Quality Lead Ambassador School, which acknowledges our work with parents, our Rights Respecting school status and the Diana Award, to name but a few.

In April and May 2019 we asked parents and carers to offer their views on issues around wellbeing at Hampstead School, offering us food for thought and action. One of the dominant themes was around developing our website to offer resources and information around wellbeing and mental health issues; we have now established a link on our website,

Parents and carers also asked our Senior Leadership Team to address staff training on wellbeing. In the Summer and Autumn terms 2019 the school put in place 13 hours of mental health and wellbeing training for all staff on Attachment Awareness/Trauma Informed Practice; the biggest commitment of all Camden Schools, to help staff understand barriers to learning.

Over the coming months, we will continue to respond to parent and carers' suggestions, posting updates in Hampstead Buzz and on the website; you will also find our Wellbeing Strategy on the website.

We would like to thank you for working in partnership with us, and if you have any suggestions for improvement, please contact us.

INTERVIEW OF ZEINA, STUDENT WELLBEING LEAD

Hampstead School's Wellbeing drive would not thrive if it was simply a staff-led initiative. It would cease to exist if it

was not additionally steered by the student body. Into this role has stepped Zeina of Year 11, who has taken on the role of Student Wellbeing Lead.

The first thing you notice about Zeina, when discussing this issue, is her expertise on how exactly *wellbeing* is being promoted in Hampstead School. She is clearly at the forefront, thanks to her position on the Student Leadership Council, in raising the profile of mental health and wellbeing within the community.



Zeina placed a large focus on making people feel safe within and around the school community, in light of the ongoing issue of knife crime on the streets of Britain, citing the 6 week workshop on weapons' awareness that has been put on for the Year 9 cohort during the first term. 'If a student does not feel safe in school, how are they meant to excel?' she asks.

She is additionally committed to ensuring that more is done to promote this and other issues through the pastoral side of school life, from PSHCRE lessons to tutor time and assemblies. She is determined that students take a lead on developing this, stressing that, 'Learning should be interactive and a presentation delivered by a peer is often more approachable and powerful than from a teacher. It also develops confidence.' she adds.

Communication is key, via avenues such as questionnaires and surveys for students, letters and emails to parents and carers at home. The link to the new wellbeing site is linked on the school's website. Zeina cites a recent survey to which over 600 students and 90% of teachers responded, arguing that 'We cannot improve the school unless we hear the voice of all stakeholders.' It is also imperative, she points out, that everyone has access to the information they need on this topic, notably, the 30 self-help books available in the school's Independent Learning Centre.

Going above and beyond in her role as student link worker, Zeina also has an acute understanding of the staff role in the promotion of wellbeing at Hampstead School. 'When staff are informed, relationships will blossom,' she muses.

Staff have already received several hours of training on trauma informed practice. She argues that it is key that all staff understand just exactly how children develop in different ways and the vast range of possible root causes for their behaviour and actions.

With Zeina at the helm of student voice on mental health and wellbeing, Hampstead School is in safe hands.

ADOMUS INTERVIEWS KAMAL ABOUT HIS RISING CAREER IN JUDO

Hampstead School is home to a selection of talented people who had established inspiring careers after their time in education, and rose to highly-reputable positions in their field of work. From the contemporary novelist Zadie Smith, to Jamie Waylett, an actor involved in the Harry Potter series – the school has its history of esteemed individuals, and Kamal is no exception.

After a near decade of competitions and fights, he has earned himself the title of the number one competitor in Britain for cadets, and his talent is showing a promising start to an even more prestigious position world-wide. But what is Kamal's perspective? How and when did he find his passion, and where has it taken him so far in his life?

Kamal took his brother as an inspiration, who began participating in Judo first - and after winning his first trophy - encouraged Kamal to start competing himself.

Kamal's first competition was on March 2011. The competition consisted of three fights in total, all of which he won. However, more recently, Kamal has been reflecting on his competition results from last year's Nationals. The competition was made up of six fights, four of which he won, but losing the first and the last. He says that this was not discouraging, and he looks back on the memory as overwhelmingly positive, fuelling him to improve.

Regarding his favourite aspects in Judo, Kamal says that the sport has given him the opportunity to travel around different countries, where he is able to meet new people and make new friends. Judo has taken him across Europe extensively, including countries like Germany, France, Switzerland and Italy. If Kamal continues to show consistent progress in his squad, his success will enable him to travel even further across the globe to China, Japan and South Africa. He also enjoys the sense of achievement from competing against other people nationwide. Judo has helped Kamal with stress inside and out of school, and has generally helped boost his well-being and keep his head clear as he prepares for his GCSE examinations.

After nearly nine years of persistent determination, it is not uncommon for most people to feel burned out or overwhelmed, even if it is regarding a sport or hobby that they are passionate about, but when asked what keeps him motivated if he ever feels overworked, Kamal explains that he strives to "think about all the positive things he has achieved so far, and what he perseveres". He is due to receive his black belt in February 2020.

When asked what advice he would give to other people beginning Judo – or those considering trying it out – Kamal said: "Try your best and go for it. It could be the best thing that ever happened to you." Advice that he got from his own brother and coach, and that he has used to create his stellar career as Britain's top performing Judo fighter.

KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE

This half term, the school has continued its 'universal' approach to Keeping Children Safe, promoting positive emotional health and fostering fundamental British values

 democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, mutual respect for and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs and for those without faith.

All of Year 9 students participated in the weapons awareness programme, delivered by the Detached Team from Camden. This was an in depth 6-week programme which aimed to raise awareness of knife crime and prevent and deter young people from carrying knifes and other weapons. Both staff and students found the programme to be hard hitting, informative and very honest.



A small group of our Hampstead Anti-bullying peer supporters (HABZ) and Year 12 prefects participated in the Solution not Sides workshop. This programme used the Israeli-Palestine conflict to illustrate the importance of discourse and evidence-based

understanding of each other's positions. Solutions are thus more possible. The seminars are part of the school's drive towards encouraging pro-social behaviour.

Here at Hampstead School, we continue our journey to becoming an Attachment Aware/Trauma-Informed school. KCA, one of the country's leading providers in this field have now completed the whole school training and are working with a small change team to look at how this can be sustained and embedded. An important element of this development is the move towards restorative conversations to remedy misdemeanours. Restorative Justice for Schools has worked with middle leaders, who are now cascading to all staff.

These developments are exciting and constitute a major shift in ethos and student self-management, both in and out of school.

BASKETBALL SEASON - YEARS 7 AND 8


