### ENGLISH & MEDIA ACTIVITIES

A Level Literature trip to National Portrait Gallery and Pre-Raphaelite Sisterhood exhibition



- Students were lucky enough to attend a private lecture on art in Tudor Britain and see the only last portrait of Shakespeare. They also viewed some masterpiece artworks by a group of women often overlooked in history in favour of men. Students explored the artwork, cultural world and feminist struggle for poets and artists like Christina Rossetti to support their Pre1900 Literary study.

Year 12 Language & Literature trip to British Museum and Troy: Myth and Reality exhibition

- Students asked to make connections between the texts they are studying and wider world and this exhibition provided it. To support their study of the poet Carol Ann Duffy who includes references and narrative devices from myth in her work students explored dramatic ancient sculptures and exquisite vase paintings to powerful contemporary works depicting the heroes and heartbroken, women and wanderers who are said to have played a part in the Trojan War and why have they inspired so many retellings.

Year 13 Media Studies video workshops at The Roundhouse

- Students developed their coursework through an exciting opportunity to work with industry professionals. In the last of a series of workshops Y13 students have attended this year, our students finalised the edits of their music video production work with the support of professional video editors. The quality of the final products was fantastic.

Year 11 English Literature Theatre Performance of Macbeth

- To support students revision of the play Fred Theatre performed a 90 minute dramatic retelling of the Scottish play. Students were involved in the performance through audience participation and a fantastic Q&A session after the performance. Fred Theatre also performed a retelling of A Christmas Carol to Y10 in the Autumn Term.

### UK POLAR NETWORK SCIENTIST VISIT
