## ACTION FOR CONSERVATION: WildED Conservation Project

Four Year 9 students took on the might of London in the quest for conservation and only narrowly missed out on first place. Reuben H, Mubin Al K, Billy G and Mustafa EA worked tirelessly from September to December to get to grips with the ideas underpinning conservation, with the help of WildED (a conservationist programme for students), alongside many other Year 9 students. Students involved had to develop these ideas into a design, then create and action their own localised conservation project.

The winners of the intra-Hampstead School competition would take part in a 'Dragons Den' style presentation to prominent conservationists in the country, against other schools in London. The Hampstead School group created an education outreach programme for inner-city students without the experience of rural conservation. This centred upon a trip organised by the group for some Year 7 students to teach them some core environmental ideas. With the initial action concluded, the students had to pull together all of these components to present to five intimidating judges; ranging from a National Geographic writer to the environmental spokesperson for the Green Party.

The students delivered an excellent analysis of their project. Judges were in awe at the degree of action they were able to complete in such a short period of time.

## STUDENT INVESTOR CHALLENGE

Congratulations to Hampstead School Year 10 and Year 13 teams who made it to the semi-finals.

The Student Investor Challenge is a UK wide investment game for students aged

16-18. The competition involves teams investing a virtual £100,000 on the London Stock Exchange. They need to keep their portfolios healthy by following the ups and downs of the market, judging when to buy and sell in order to make a profit.

This year, there were 4856 teams involved in the first round and 500 were selected to go through to semi-finals. Hampstead School had two teams going through – 'Team 5' made up of four boys from Year 10 and 'The A-Team' which was four boys from Year 13.

This was a fantastic achievement for the students as it was a tough year for the markets, which made it even more competitive.

## CHILDREN'S MENTAL HEALTH WEEK 5- 11 February 2018

As part of our commitment to our students' emotional health and wellbeing, we took part in Children's Mental Health week (5th-11th February).

The theme this year was 'Being Ourselves,' aiming to encourage children, young people and adults to celebrate their uniqueness.

Statistics show that 10% of young people (3 in every class of 30) aged 5 to 16 will experience a mental health problem, whilst the rate of anxiety and depression in adolescents has increased by 75% in the last 25 years.

Research shows that promoting positive mental health not only improves students' emotional wellbeing, but also improves their attitude to learning, increases attendance and lowers exclusion rates.

In the lead up to the week, PSHCE and support teachers were provided with training on how to teach about Mental Health in order to facilitate PSHCE lessons on the subject of resilience and emotional health. In addition, throughout the week, assemblies were dedicated to this important issue.
