HEAD'S MESSAGE

As the Summer examination series approaches, as always interventions and examination preparation ratchets up into a plethora of activity. These include:

- Busy and very well attended Easter holiday school
- Regular Saturday school since middle of January being attended by an increasing number of students
- Allocated after school revision timetable for all subjects
- Targeted students for all above

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- Mentoring and learning conversations underway
- Another round of pre-public examinations in some subjects.

We wish all our students the very best in the run up to their all-important examinations.

The publication of examination performance will change considerably in 2016, with the redundant 5A*-C measure at GCSE replaced with a much greater emphasis, rightly, on progress. The new measure is called Progress 8 (alongside Attainment 8). The Department for Education calculated that our Progress 8 would have been +0.4 last year, which means that students achieved considerably above expectation.

Secondary transfer offers day is now reported regularly in the media and we were pleased to offer 210 new students a place for September. We are holding a large waiting list, and over a quarter of applications for siblings. I know that this level of confidence in the school is predominantly through word-of-mouth. Thank you!

Our building work continues. With outdoor space at a premium, we have opened numerous internal facilities for students at our shortened lunchtime, including a daily film screening in the hall. Students have adapted really well to the reduction in space and have impressed us all.

US Ambassador, Matthew Barzun Visit

Hampstead School was delighted to host a visit from the US Ambassador to the UK, Matthew Barzun.

Ambassador Barzun engaged in a discussion with students. The focus largely centred on US policy, guns, foreign policy, diplomacy and humanitarian aid. Students posed thoughtful, knowledgeable, and at times challenging questions throughout.

Embassy staff commented that they were thoroughly

impressed with the students' global understanding, ability to phrase emotive questions and confidence to partake.

The Ambassador commented that this was one of the most enjoyable events he has run, out of over one hundred schools. The visit provided a unique and enriching opportunity for Hampstead School students to engage with international affairs.

COMPUTING FOCUS WEEK 8 - 12 February 2016

This year's Focus Week coincided with Safer Internet Day on 9th February with a range of activities to encourage both students and teachers to use computing concepts into



subject areas. Students completed problem solving activities during registration and entered a prize draw. During PSHCE lessons Key stage 3 and 4, tutors delivered an E-safety lesson to discuss topics around cyber bullying, online grooming and digital footprint.

12 Hampstead School students were invited to attend the Safer Internet Day 2016 event in London. Mrs Davis took 4 students to No.10 Downing Street for a question and answer session with the Prime Minister's Advisor regarding what the government can do to make the internet safer for young people. The second part of the event was held at the BT Centre where students did various activities relating to how students can play their part in helping to create a better and safer internet. Junada A (8.2) was chosen for a roundtable E-safety discussion and contributed his views clearly on the stage with representatives from the BBC, Twitter and Facebook.

To encourage girls into studying computing there was a session on building PCs and another session has been planned for the summer term - targeted at Key Stage 3 girls. Mrs Buecher conducted a session on programming buggies using crumble kits to Key Stage 3 students.

Lastly, 40 students from the Digital Leaders Club and High Potential Learners from Year 10 visited the National Museum of Computing at Bletchley Park. The students met Computer Scientists and received fascinating talks on the evolution of computers; including the Colossus - the first electronic, digital, programmable computer.

In the Intermediate Maths Challenge, Year 8 to Year 13 we received another set of good results with a medal haul of 3 gold, 17 Silver and 27 Bronze.

ENRICHMENT DAY

Our third Enrichment Day gave students an insight into the criminal justice system. The Year 9 group were privileged to have a series of presentations and workshops on the areas of the law that most affect them as young people. The highlight of the day was a talk given by the Author, Aneeta Prem on forced marriages.

Year 8 visited the Science Museum. The museum organised the day especially for the Hampstead School Science Faculty as the school have been taking part in the enterprising science project. Students were able to experience a range of exhibitions and hands-on activities looking at sound and how technology has changed over the last 100 years. The IMAX showing of the 'Unseen World' really got students talking about the microscopic world.

The last two Enrichment Days Years 10 and 11 Religious Studies students spent a day at St Paul's Cathedral to complement their GCSE studies on Christianity and Islam. The definite highlight of the day for both trips was the climb to the top of the Dome and seeing the views of London from on high.

Year 12 visited the University of East Anglia during the day in order to get an experience of university life.

Arthur Miller's classic American drama was set in 1692, but written in 1953, drawing parallels between the hypocrisy and suspicion experienced in the McCarthy era with the Salem Witch-hunts. The engaging production brought to life the small community of Salem which had been stirred into madness by superstition and paranoia. In particular Act 3 was an intense court scene which had us on the edge of our seats, as John Proctor contested the witchcraft trials. In this scene Abigail and the rest of the girls caught our attention through their synchronised movements and facial expressions which added to the dramatic impact of the court scene.

Lutfa S, Year 13 commented "watching the production has really brought the play to life for us, adding to our appreciation of the dramatic effects. We look forward to integrating these ideas into our work and exam responses.'
